STRATEGIC PLANNING SUMMARY

ITCA Maternal Health Innovation (MHI) Program

In 2020, the Arizona Department of Health Services (ADHS), through a Maternal Health Innovation (MHI) grant from the Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA), contracted with the Inter Tribal Council of Arizona to develop a tribal maternal health strategic plan.

The strategic plan was developed by maternal health professionals from Tribal communities in Arizona and outlines seven priority areas to mitigate and prevent severe maternal morbidity and mortality in Tribal communities in Arizona. This document provides a summary of the key information in the strategic plan. Tribal leaders, health care professionals, health care facilities, and community members are encouraged to refer to this action plan and roadmap to identify priority actions based on the specific needs of their community.
